Coming of Age...

Recently I received a magazine called the Seniors Info Exchange. It is published by the Seniors secretariat, a branch of the Department of Health and Welfare (Federal Government). It was difficult to choose which topic to share so we will run down the list over the next few issues. We'll start with seniors and sexuality. Much of this information is directly from the article.

For all practical purposes, older people are sexless, and sexuality no longer has a role to play in their lives. Many are without partners, and even those who do aren't interested in sex any more TRUE or FALSE?

According to gerontologist Judith Stryckman, of the National Advisory Council on Aging, nothing could be further from the truth. A study of Canadian seniors conducted by

Ms. Stryckman found that seven out of 10 married couples who did not have major health problems were sexually active, sometimes into their late eighties. While physical changes may influence the ways in which people express their sexuality, age has less effect on sexual interest than do patterns established over a lifetime. She also found that, in general, people who have a strong interest in sex when they are young will continue to do so throughout their lives.

Respecting seniors' sexuality

Changing attitudes are required to help older people accept and enjoy their sexuality. The research shows that some seniors may feel guilty or embarrassed about their continuing strong interest in sex, while others may cease sexual activity because they do not consider it appropriate for people of their age.

Here are some pointers on how to help seniors feel comfortable with their sexuality, and how to provide them with the freedom, respect and privacy they need to develop fulfilling and intimate relationships:

* support and encourage

seniors' interest in their appearance and their individuality;

 encourage seniors' children to accept their parents' sexuality, and their possible need for intimate contact;

* recognize that sexuality may be expressed in many physical and emotional ways, only one of which is sexual intercourse;

*ensure that seniors have the opportunity to meet members of the opposite sex; and

*do not deprive seniors of the privacy they need in order to develop an intimate relationship; and

* encourage seniors to speak up for themselves and make others aware of their right to make decisions about their own sexuality.

The Yukon River Commercial Fishing Association approves of and supports the concept of the Draft Yukon Environment Act. We believe that the pristine quality of the Yukon Environment is the Yukon's most valuable resource and must be accorded top priority when considering any plans for development. The wilderness which surrounds us is basic to the Yukon lifestyle, and of itself shapes the Yukon character. Any future development must be consistent with that character.

We are concerned that many important segments of Yukon society seem to be opposing this Act. Everyone agrees that

environmental protection in itself is a worthy objective, but few seem willing to pay the price. Miners and other groups seem to believe that environmental protection should only be indulged in to the extent that it does not seriously impact the economics of mining and other industries. They'd prefer to have a clean environment, but not if it means tightening their belts. In our view the public debate has become focused upon the cost of implementing the Act, rather than upon the necessity for having an

The Yukon River Commercial Fishing Association holds that environmental protection is not a

debating point or a choice to be made depending on convenience or underlying economics.Rather it is imperative for our continued survival, regardless of cost. It has become obvious that the planet cannot continue to sustain the abuse that mankind is subjecting it to. If we don't clean up and protect our environment, it will no longer provide for us. If we've got to tighten our belts and accept a lower standard of living, so be it. The cost of a cleanup will never be cheaper. To postpone it is only to increase the eventual pain.

Our support for the Act does not mean we find it flawless. We believe the operative words used in the Draft Act are in some cases

too weak. For example, in Part XV, Protection of Wilderness, 75 (2), the Draft Act states "... shall treat wilderness as a resource which should be considered...". We feel the Act must say "shall" instead of "should". We believe this implies a greater commitment on the part of the Yukon Government to protect the environment.

We believe that Part XV, Protection of Wilderness, represents the backbone of the Act. As such, this Part must be expanded to encompass a complete definition of wilderness in all its facets. It must be clear in this Part that wilderness includes not only air, land, water, and

vegetation, but also fish and wildlife. This definition must be up front in the Act, and immediately clear to anyone reading it. The definition of "wilderness" sets the tone for the Act. It describes the uniqueness of the Yukon Environment and should therefore be included in the text of the Act, and not only in the "definitions" Part.

In summary, the Yukon River Commercial Fishing Association supports the Government initiative to enact a Yukon Environment Act. We feel an Act is long overdue. Our concern is that it be strong enough to do the job intended.

You have seen personal ads in public places and newspapers offering bargain airline tickets. Generally speaking, for sale is the return half of a ticket which has no refund status, and is sold to anyone willing to travel under the name on the ticket.

As I have been asked many mes about selling the other half of a ticket, I thought it would be a good idea to devote a column to this practice, and what it means to the airlines and travel agents.

In buying a ticket from either a travel agency or the airline, you have formed a contract with the Tickets are nonendorsable in most cases, which means they must be used by the passenger whose name is shown

on the ticket. Selling this ticket is illegal.

The reason for this is exemplified by a worst case scenario in which, for instance, the plane crashes. The airline, in notifying next of kin, uses the passenger manifest. If Mr. Jones' relatives were notified that he had perished in the crash, when in actuality Mr. Smith was travelling under Mr. Jones' name, you can imagine the lawsuits that would be filed against the airline. That is why it is considered illegal.

As a buyer of these unused tickets, one should be aware of the consequences involved if you are caught. You will be denied boarding, and will be out whatever sum of money you paid

the seller. As a seller, remember that whatever happens, your name is on the line, in more ways than one.

# Klondike Valley Fire Fighters Association

The KVFFA has been keeping fairly active lately - luckily there have not been any recent fires to fight. However, training and fund-raising are two activities on the go.

On the evenings of April 9, 10 and 11, Jim Smith from the Public Safety Branch of YTG will be giving our fire fighters additional in-depth training. As well, training is being provided at each regular practice by Fire Chief Mark Bowers, Bill Harris or Frank Bunyan. Now that we have most of the equipment and gear required for fire fighting, training has become much more productive.

Fund-raising is another big activity. Although YTG plans to eventually provide us with all the equipment, trucks, hall, etc. that are contained in the Fire Protection Policy, much of this is a year or more down the road. And we feel very strongly that we must do everything possible to be able to provide a reliable fire protection service NOW! Therefore, we must pick up the tab ourselves for anything we purchase to enable us to better provide that service. The big right now communications. Of the 4 mobile radios donated to us by the City of Whitehorse, only one is the kind that can be plugged into 110

volt power supply. The others are DC power only and the power packs needed for them are almost as expensive as the radios themselves. As they have been labelled "unreliable" technicians, we have decided not to pay the cost of getting the power packs. Which leaves us with one base station, one mobile radio and two hand-helds. And a phone, of course. The communications issue is a twofold one. We need to offer a 24hour answering service to any calls from residents and we need a fast, reliable way to contact our fire fighters. So...not much money, no easy answers. But this is definitely a priority and our fund-raising efforts are all aimed toward purchasing communications equipment.

Most of the fund-raising in the near future will involve security services for various functions. We could really use more help!! dropouts. Youth are given practical training, work experience, along with guidance and information, concerning their future education and labour market options. It started in 1985 as

an experimental summer project and now is a year-round program with more than \$35 million earmarked for it by the federal government in 1990-91.

It is part of the Minister of State for Youth's national Stay-In-School initiative to reduce Canada's 30 per cent high school dropout rate.

## 30 per cent drop out Stay-In-School campaign launched

(NC)-OTTAWA—Three of 10 students in Canada drop out before completing high school although almost two-thirds of new jobs being created require more than Grade 12, says Employment and Immigration

As a result, the Minister of State of Youth, Marcel Danis, has launched a national Stay-In-School initiative to lower the drop out rate.

Stay-In-School has three principle components:

## Stay-In-School

·Labour market programs and services aimed at youth who are potential dropouts, such as career assessments, work experience pro-jects and other support activities including mentoring and adopt-aschool projects;

·Mobilizing all those with a stake in youth to become involved in finding solutions to the dropout problem in their community through dis-cussions, information exchange and



# COMMUNITY ACCESS COMMUNICATONS

Dawson City is the Yukon's only rural community which has community access to both FM radio and television.

CFYT went on air in the winter of '82-83 while DCTV has been since broadcasting February, 1990. Both are volunteer operations and funds the raised generated operate are through sponsorship and advertising.

"Community Access" means just that — the community has access to local radio and t.v. to help deliver local messages to a local market. The goal is to provide the service for an affordable cost and at a technologial level which just about anyone can learn, while at the same time producing a quality product.

For CFYT and DCTV, the is primarily product music and public service announcements. the heard music on Channel II message board is actually the CFYT radio broadcast. The variety in programmes determined by the number of volunteer dj's and producers - their interests, skill and time. Advertising on Channel II is playing a greater role as businesses take advantage of the easy access to Dawson's market.

The next major step for CFYT/DCTV is to install a video production facility. The production facility will give volunteers the ability to do "t.v. quality" video production. From there, local t.v. programming can become a greater part of what the station broadcasts. It will

become common to see shows on Dawson's special events such as Spring Carnival and the Music Festival. A weekly news show is possible. The ideas are limited only by one's imagination.

Perhaps you have some ideas? Now is the time to get involved with both the radio and t.v. The Society is raising funds so that a video production studio can be installed. From there, training will be offered to volunteers on how to do tv. shows and the new programming begins. 

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

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# CREATURE **COMFORTS**

by Shelley Hakonson



Maybe one day I'll do a column on healthy, calorieconscious food, but I doubt it . . . . this one definitely isn't. These are homey snack-type sweets for after school and apres-ski.

This is the first cookie I learned to make in Home Economics in grade 8 and I still make it. It's simple and good.

## Snickerdoodles

I cp. butter 1 1/4 cp. sugar 2 large eggs 2 3/4 cp. flour 2 tsp. cream of tartar 1 tsp. baking soda 1/4 tsp. salt 1 tsp. cinnamon

1 tbsp. cinnamon | -- In a bowl 2 tbsp. sugar

Beat butter and sugar, beat in eggs. Beat in 1 cp. flour, cream of tartar, baking soda and salt. Stir in remaining flour and cinnamon to make a soft dough.

Roll into small balls and roll in the cinnamon-sugar mixture, place about 2" apart on ungreased baking sheets and bake for 10-12

## Applesauce Spice Cake

This is a great little cake. It stays moist and fresh for a long time, especially if stored in an airtight container. Its flavour actually improves the second

1 cp. unsalted butter, softened 2 cps. fine or berry sugar (or make some fine sugar in your blender)

2 cps. unsweetened applesauce

3 cps. sifted flour

1 cp. coarsely chopped pecans

1 cp. raisins

1 tsp. cinnamon 1 tsp. nutmeg

I tsp. vanilla

1/2 tsp. mace

1 3/4 tsp. baking soda

## **Brown Sugar Frosting**

2 cps. firmly packed brown sugar 6 tbsp. heavy cream 1/4 cp. unsalted butter I tsp. vanilla 1 cp. sifted icing sugar

Preheat oven to 325° and grease a 9" tube pan, then cut out a piece of wax paper to fit the bottom and grease it lightly, 24 tbsp. icing sugar dust the tube pan with flour, shaking out excess.

Cream the butter and fine sugar till fluffy, 3 minutes, then fold in the applesauce. This will not mix completely.

Remove 1/4 cup of the flour to a bowl and use it to dredge the nuts and raisins. Sift together the remaining flour, spices and baking soda. Fold the dry mixture into the creamed

mixture, then add the vanilla and nuts and raisins and the 1/4 cup of flour.

Pour batter into prepared pan and bake for 1 1/4 hours, or until cake tester comes out clean. Allow to cool in the pan, then invert onto a plate.

### Frosting

Place all ingredients for the frosting except the vanilla and icing sugar into a large pot and slowly bring to a rolling boil over medium heat, stirring all the time. Remove pan from heat and stir in the vanilla and icing sugar.

Pour frosting onto the top of the cake and let it run down the sides. This sets quickly so don't try to spread it around with a spatula, let it flow naturally.

This brown sugar frosting doubles as candy by simply adding 1/2 cup or so of chopped nuts and pouring the mixture into a shallow buttered pan to cool. Cut into squares.

## Mount Vernon Gingerbread

I forget where I got this recipe or why it has this name, but it's very good and with the addition of the mock whipped cream icing it's wonderful.

2 3/4 cp. sifted flour

2 1/2 tsp. ginger

I tsp. salt

1 tsp. baking soda

1/2 tsp. cinnamon 1/2 tsp. nutmeg

1/2 tsp. cloves

1 cp. molasses

1/2 cp. brown sugar

8 tbsp. butter

3/4 cp. sour milk or buttermilk

1/4 cp. orange juice

2 eggs, lightly beaten

Sift together the first seven ingredients.

In a pot combine molasses, brown sugar and butter and bring to a simmer stirring 2-3 times. Cool to lukewarm and stir the buttermilk and the molasses mixture into the dry ingredients.

Add the orange juice and the eggs, stirring lightly until batter is smooth. Pour batter into a well-buttered 9" x 14" pan and bake at 350° for 30-35 minutes. Cool and ice with:

## Mock Whipped Cream Icing

1 cp. soft butter 4 tbsp. cold milk 4 tbsp. boiling water

Beat sugar and butter together, add cold milk, a few drops at a time -- keep beating steadily. Add the boiling water drop by drop -- keep beating. It will take about five minutes beating to whip the icing. Add a dash of vanilla and use immediately.



## CLEARING HOUSE

Can you tell me why my fingernails are soft and break easily while other peoples are much harder?

Here are some causes of nail problems which can be rectified by changes in diet.

-Opaque white bands appear on nails. Nails are dry, brittle, thin. (Protein deficiency)

-Slow growth.( Insufficient amounts of complete protein and/or vitamin A. Can also be caused by various drugs.)

-Dryness, brittleness (Shortage of vitamin A or calcium )

-Fragile nails, horizontal or vertical ridges (Lack of B vitamins).

-Fungus Infestation underneath nails (Lack of B complex vitamins).

-Hangnails (Lack of vitamin C, folic acid or protein)

-Disturbed growth, dryness, brittleness, flattening (iron deficiency)

 White spots (zinc deficiency) Also there are these problems and causes:

-Yellow nails (Nicotine, polish with no base coat, Long term use of the prescription drug tetracycline.)

-Horizontal grooves ( Appear after illness or trauma and will grow out in time).

-Spoon nails, or nails that are concave in the centre ( Caused by iron deficiency anemia or coronary disease, also by long term use of strong soaps and solvents).

-Pale nail bed (Anemia)

Nails also give clues to your doctor about diseases, and any persistent problem should be discussed with him.

Here are some guidelines for healthy nails-

1. Protect your hands from prolonged immersion in water, especially soapy water.

2. Keep nails short to prevent them getting splits which trap

3. Trim nails regularly with scissors and cut toenails straight across ( a curve may damage skin at the corners of

4. Leave Cuticle alone or push down with cuticle stick or thumbnail of opposite hand.

5. Nail polish remover makes the nails weak and brittle. Don't use oftener than once a week.

Local merchants have continued to be supportive, making Moose Mountain a great victory, allowing folks to reach ski runs within ten minutes.

It takes many folks to make this attraction operative and new faces replace those who have left the scene. The Sprokkreeffs, Jennifer Flynn, Glenda Miller, among many others, are lending great support, should you want to ask how you can help. With skiers from Ft. McPherson to Whitehorse enjoying Moose Mountain, Dawson presents one more attraction to travellers.




